Prayer Focus

By the time you read this we will have celebrated the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in remembrance of the last meal that he held with his disciples before he left them to go to the cross and bear the agony of being forsaken by his followers. He even professed that they would do so by telling them "This very night you will run away and leave me". (Matthew 26v31) On the cross he felt that his Father had left him and he experienced a terrible separation from him and cried out "My God, My God why have you forsaken me?"

There may be times in life when we feel forgotten and alone. Times when we have hurts, fears and anxieties. A child moves away from home. A loved one passes on. We leave a job or a community and it feels as if we have left everything behind.

God never abandoned Jesus in his greatest hour of need. It was all part of His great plan to save the lost and those who were, and are, separated from Him. God won't leave us either when we desperately need Him. Our Lord knows when we are hurt and He experiences our pain.
