This Week's Word

Matthew 10: 26-31

We're sometimes tempted to think that small things don't matter. That we don't matter. We imagine that our presence, our voice, our faith or our prayers are just one among so many and that if we weren't there, nothing would really change. It's easy to feel like our contribution doesn't count.

But Jesus doesn't see the world that way.

In Matthew 10, he says something that sounds almost absurd in its detail: that the hairs on our heads are numbered. Not roughly counted, but numbered one by one, as if each strand had its own ID card. He's making the point that in God's kingdom, nothing's too small to matter.

To understand why Jesus says this, we need to look at the context. He's just sent out the twelve disciples on their first mission and he's told them to heal the sick and proclaim that the kingdom of heaven has come near. But he's also been very honest about what the disciples will face. He warns them they'll be like sheep among wolves. He tells them they may be flogged, dragged before governors, even betrayed by members of their own families.

As recruitment speeches go, it's hardly inspiring. You can imagine the disciples thinking, "Why are we doing this? We're just twelve ordinary men. What difference can we possibly make against everything that's stacked against us?"

And that's when Jesus says, "*Do not be afraid.*" He says it three times in six verses and in between his reassurances he talks about sparrows, he says none of them falls to the ground unnoticed by God. Every tiny life, every small death, it registers.

And if that's true of sparrows, Jesus says, how much more is it true of us? Even the hairs of our heads are numbered.

What moves me about this passage is that Jesus doesn't promise the disciples that nothing bad will happen. He doesn't say we won't lose our hair (sadly, in my case) or our freedom, or even our lives. What he promises is that none of it happens outside of God's knowledge and care. Nothing's too small for God to notice. No-one's too insignificant for God to love.

That's so different from how the world works. We'd be forgiven for thinking it's only the big things that matter; the billionaires, the viral moments, the impressive achievements. Up against all of these, we just don't seem all that important.

But God sees things differently. In God's eyes, the widow's mite carries weight. The cup of water matters. The prayer whispered in secret is heard. The kindness shown when nobody's watching is seen.

And when I think about what keeps a church going, it's not the dramatic things. It's the person who makes the tea. The elder who visits faithfully. The person who hoovers the hall. The treasurer doing the accounts. None of these things make headlines, but they make a church. They make *our* church.

Jesus says God knows about every single one of these acts. So we can stop worrying about whether we matter enough. In God's kingdom, there is no such thing as insignificant. Our lives, our faith, our witness – they matter so much more than we realise.

Jesus' message to the disciples is his message to us: "*Do not be afraid; you are worth much more than many sparrows.*" We are seen. We are known. We are valued. Every one of us.
