#### Blythswood Care Shoebox Appeal

We hope you will be happy to support the shoebox appeal this year. As in past years, we are liaising with Buckie Baptist Church, who have a team ready to cover and pack the shoeboxes to transport to those in need. However if you can cover your boxes that would be much appreciated.

Here is a quote from Blythswood about last year's shoebox deliveries: "Through challenging days of restriction and uncertainty, 88,816 boxes were delivered to people in need across Eastern Europe last winter. This winter, we will again be sending shoeboxes to people in Ukraine, to neighbouring countries supporting Ukrainian refugees, as well as to those whose lives continue to be marked by poverty across Eastern Europe. Your support counts more than ever in 2023."

On Saturday 9 September, I entered Edinburgh's General Assembly Hall for the first time. The occasion - to attend The Guild Annual Gathering, the biggest event in the Guild's year. There was an uplifting buzz about the place as I searched for a seat out of camera view! Some ladies from Currie (a village on the outskirts of Edinburgh) welcomed me as I settled down beside them. During conversation I soon discovered they had connections with a few people in Portsoy.

Before starting the meeting, General Secretary Karen Gillon gave some safety and housekeeping information. With her cheerful personality it was not long before she had the audience in fits of laughter. National Convener 2022-23, Helen Eckford conducted opening devotions and gave a review of her term in office. Personal reflections followed from the Moderator, Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton. Unfortunately the planned interaction with some of the livestream venues around the country didn't work. Karen updated us on the current six Guild Projects with approximately £300,000 raised so far.

As the meeting broke for lunch my new friends from Currie invited me to join them. We were like-minded and had brought our own packed lunches. It was a hot, sunny day and with plenty time left before the meeting resumed, we took a stroll around the old town and many landmarks were pointed out to me. It began to feel like my new found friends, Moira, Elizabeth, Janet and Mary, had been my pals for years. They were amazing! By the castle, some of us indulged in an ice-cream - as I said the weather was hot, and well...any excuse.....!!

Heading back to the Assembly Hall I stopped by the Guild's pop up shop to make a few purchases, where I bumped into Flora Buthlay, the Guild's National Vice-Convener, who said she was looking forward to speaking at Portsoy Guild in February.

The afternoon exceeded all my expectations. Guest speaker was Professor Jason Leitch, CBE. As The National Clinical Director he spoke about Covid and its challenges. Serious and humorous, we were captivated by his talk. Jason is also a board member of The Nazareth Trust and a trustee of the Indian Rural Evangelical Fellowship (UK). It runs a children's home and schools in southeast India where Jason has exercised his skills as a dentist and taught students in this line of work. A Salvation Army choir provided the entertainment. Led by Matt Ramsay, The Govan Songsters brilliantly sang a mix of old and new songs. A sea of colourful ribbons surrounded the room as the audience waved in time to the music.

Her term in office now over, Helen Eckford removed her badge before the new National Convener 2023-24, Rae Lind was installed by Rev George Lind. The day had been interspersed with hymn singing accompanied by Iain Whyte on the organ.

As the Annual Gathering came to an end, I felt blessed to be a part of this wonderful day.
