Weekly message from John Gow

2 Kings 2: 19-25

Matthew 17: 14-20

We're looking at a bit of an odd story this week in church, where the prophet Elisha calls down on a curse on some boys, which ends up with them getting torn to bits by bears, just because they call him make fun of his baldness. As always in scripture however, I think there's a wee bit more going on that what we pick up on first hearing or reading the story.

To start with, we hear them described as boys, but the Hebrew word for boys covers anything from 12-year-olds to teenagers, even young men in their twenties. So the chances are they were young men who should have known better. In effect, what the boys were saying Elisha was they didn't have any need for him or his God.

Justifiably Elisha was annoyed by this – and by the 'baldhead' comment, of course. Whether he meant for them to be attacked by bears I suppose we've no way of knowing. What Elisha did was put the matter into God's hands but the important thing to remember is that it was God who decided on the boys' punishment, not Elisha.

The whole situation was all the more frustrating for Elisha as he'd only just come from Jericho, where he'd purified the lake there, he'd made it healthy again for the people to drink from. Actually, God had – Elisha played his part with some salt and a bowl, but it was God's words he was quoting when he said, 'I make this water pure.' The people had a lot to thank Elisha for, he was their prophet, he was their conduit to God, but certain groups among them still didn't take him seriously. They didn't appreciate the power of his God, or the power that God had given to Elisha. And his frustration eventually boiled over.

Frustration isn't usually an emotion that you'd ascribe to Jesus. But in our New Testament passage this week, we can detect more than a hint of when he says: "How unbelieving and wrong you people are! How long must I stay with you? How long do I have to put up with you?" He's talking to the disciples, because they keep leaving the hard work to him, when he'd given them all the power they needed. They had the power, given by Jesus, given by God, to call on Him to perform miracles. They didn't use it. Maybe they just weren't confident enough, maybe they'd forgotten the options they'd been given for situations like this.

Is that like us with God, our Father? We rely on our own power and like the disciples we get frustrated, we fail. But when we call on him for his help, when we remember the options we've been given then things have a way of turning out right. We don't have the power to expel demons, we don't have the power to purify lakes, we don't have the power to summon up bears when someone makes fun at our expense. But with God's help to call on, we're empowered. The thing is, though, we've got to give our problems to him, for him to be able, or ready, to help. Carrying around our problems hoping for a solution isn't the answer, thinking we've got the strength to deal with them. Just putting up with them, enduring them, makes them bigger, not smaller.
